A Message from Our President:

We had a successful, if wet, Pumpkin Festival. Our festivals are always "rain or shine" events and this time we had to use "plan B." We moved about 80% of our club activities into the clubhouse and did the rest under a tent. The music and sales of pie, cake, chili, and pumpkin soup were indoors. We sold pumpkins and made and distributed Stone Soup outside. Thanks to everyone who put in all the hard work and last minute improvisation to make it happen.

This past weekend, the BSC hosted a reunion concert of Clearwater Sloop Singers. The event was organized by Mel Healy and Vinny Cerniglia. It was a fund raiser for the "upkeep of the sloops," as is the CD_Broad Old River II which was also produced by Mel and Vinny. The income is being split between Clearwater and BSC.

We've received the fan for the Multrum. It will be installed as soon as we can gather a couple of volunteers to help and arrange a date to do the work. The fan will serve a couple of purposes. First, it will provide an airflow that goes down through the toilet opening and then up through the vent stack. This will help with odor control. Also, by providing more fresh air to the composting process, we hope to see a drier and more complete breakdown of waste.

The Woody is out of the water for the winter. After taking out over 1600 guests this year, Woody will be receiving the usual mix of TLC, upgrades, and other attention our fine sloop requires. Keep an eye on the website for announcements of work parties at the boat.

The December general meeting will be Election Night. There is a highly qualified group of nominees. Please mark your calendar now for Friday, Dec 4th.

Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, November 6, 2009

Prior to the meeting music was provided by Pete Seeger and Guests Bob Killian from New Jersey and Rochelle Harper from Gulfport Mississippi. They were here for the Clearwater gathering of the Sloop Clubs.

The Meeting was called to order by President Saul Rozinsky

Founding member Pat Egan (famed Ginger cookies) passed away on October 10th. Pete Seeger and Betty Harkins spoke in her memory. A donation was made in her name to the Sloop Club.

Treasurer's Report:

We made approximately \$2100 form the Pumpkin festival in spite of the rain. Our Current Balance is \$39,074.59. This is fantastic considering that we had \$33,000 last year at this time and were faced with doing major repairs on the Woody. We had the most successful Strawberry Festival ever. And thanks to the fundraising efforts of Gigi Fris and Kevin Haden we were able to pay for the repairs to the Woody. The Captains did a yeoman's job with all the sailing this year. They took a record 1650 people sailing. Members responded to the challenge and exceeded our goals. Thanks to all.

2010 budget is being prepared. Committees need to remember to submit your requests.

The boat has been de-rigged and electronics and the batteries removed as well as the electric motor. The boat should be out of the water and in dry dock. There will be a limited number of repairs made during the winter. Seven of the old batteries we sold to club members. The remaining five we sold to the junk yard for \$85.

Clearwater:

Building Committee:

The Multrum will undergo improvements, with the installation of a fan, lengthening of the vent stack, and relocating of the access hatchway.

We will put a sign on the outside of the door to tell people to put sawdust in the Multrum and to leave the seat down (oh the gender differences)

Spending of \$400-600 dollars for repairing the sound system was approved.

A committee was appointed to improve the lighting in the club. David Eberle is chairman. Tom LaBarr, Vane Lashua, Kathy Buyers and Mark McCaroll are members.

400 Years Ago

On Nov. 7th, 1609 the Half Moon arrived back in Europe, sailing into Dartmouth harbor. It's not clear why Hudson chose to go to England rather than return to Holland. He wrote to the directors immediately but according to Van Meteren:

"Along time elapsed, through contrary winds, before the Company could be informed of the arrival of the ship in England. Then they ordered the ship and crew to return as soon as possible. But, when this was about to be done, Skipper Henry Hudson and the other Englishmen of the ship were commanded by the government there not to leave, but to serve their own country."
