Jeff has made some changes in the organization with the intent of broadening and diversifying Clearwater's fund raising program. With the economy in the state that it is in, it makes good sense to explore every possible opportunity.

The BSC faces similar challenges to those faced by Clearwater. Our usually reliable sources of grant funding have not been able to offer support at the same levels they were able to provide in prior years.

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes Tuesday, December 23, 2008

Called to order by Saul Rozinsky president Items of Business

Contract for repair of Woody

Motion was made by David Cohen and seconded by David Eberle to approve and authorize the president to sign the contract. The Motion passed unanimously.

Financial status of the Club

The Contract for \$28,000 will deplete all but \$4000 of the clubs money. In addition we need to purchase new batteries for the Woody which cost approximately \$8000.

Because of the downturn in the economy Grants are becoming harder to get. We do not raise enough money with the festivals to cover our operating budget of approximately \$90,000. We need to look at alternate ways to raise money.

There was some discussion about various means to raise money including sponsoring a concert, working with local businesses, having a pre-launch dinner, having regular dinners, spaghetti dinners, broaden raffle appeal and sell earlier, hold fundraising house parties.

A Development Committee, David Eberle, Kevin Haydon, David Cohen was formed to develop a long range development plan including fundraising. With Clearwater moving to Beacon we also need to define the nature of our relationship with Clearwater with regard to fundraising events.

The meeting was adjourned.

400 years ago this month

On January 8, 1609 Henry Hudson signed a contract with the Dutch East India Company to search for a northwest passage.

The contract required that Hudson make his residence in Holland and that his wife and children live there during his voyage. It also stipulated his route and that his journals, logbooks, and charts be delivered to the directors upon his return.

It required that, "the above named Hudson shall, about the first of April, sail in order to search for a passage by the north, around the north side of Nova Zembla, and shall continue thus along the parallel until he shall be able to sail southward to the latitude of sixty degrees." 

Ice Yachts of the Hudson

Over the holidays the FDR presidential library featured a display of vintage Hudson River ice-yachts.

The sport of iceboating was very popular in the late 19th and early 20th centuries in the mid-Hudson valley. According to the NY Times of March 7, 1896, "The Hudson River Ice Yacht Club has been organized since 1885. It is the successor of the Poughkeapsie Ice Yacht Club, which was organized in 1861, and enjoyed a prosperous existence for twenty-four years. Poughkeepsie has always been the headquarters for Ice yachts in this country, and the Challenge Pennant of America is its most honorable and highly prized trophy. The first

commodore of the club was J. A. Roosevelt, uncle of FDR. There were active clubs at other locations, most notably, New Hamburg under commodore Irving Grinnell.

With their low drag and carrying hundreds of square feet of sail, these gaff rigged craft were the speed record holders of their day.

The sport was regularly featured in the publications such as Harper's Weekly and Scribner's.




