# Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, March 6, 2009

The meeting was a called to order by Saul Rozinsky.

### **Treasurer's Report**

We have spent \$14,100 for repairs on the Woody; we also made approximately \$1600 from the Woody Dinner. Our opening balance was \$35,000 and closing balance \$30,000.

## Woody Report- Tom Baldino

A decision was made to replace two structural cross beams at both ends of the boat for an additional cost of \$1200. Repair work is proceeding on schedule. The sloop will also be professionally caulked. Re-launch is scheduled for the last week in April.

#### **Diversity**

Pete Seeger spoke about promoting diversity in the Sloop Club. We need to contact other groups and see what their interests are and if these interests can be matched up with the interests of the Sloop Club. The Youth Something to Say Café is bringing in some younger and very good musicians. But we need to work to bring in other groups. Perhaps we need to look at other forms of music besides folk music as Danny suggested.

#### **Environmental Committee**

Friday evening 7:00 PM March 20<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Robert Spiegelman will give a talk "Cooling Mother Earth: New York's Footprint in Nature, Then and Now" Are We Stewards or Lords of Nature? Dr. Spiegelman is a sociologist, multi-media artist and writer. It should be a great talk.

The next talk in the Series is April 17th; Travis Bowman will be speaking about Robert Fulton and Robert Livingston and the Fulton Steamboat Co.

The last talk is May 8<sup>th</sup>. Chris Bowser, NYS DEC Science Education Specialist will be speaking about "Eels, Aliens and Shipwrecks" He is a great and very entertaining speaker.

#### Zero Waste

Sue Altkin spoke on a new Zero Waste Program for the club. From now on we will be using dishes and instruments which can be cleaned and recycled. There was some general discussion about the committee structure of the sloop club. We would like to get people appointed to all the committees and key positions at the beginning of the year. We also want to have a detail account of what the duties are so that people know what they are to do. We need our older leaders to train new leaders.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn.


# **Volunteers Needed to Track Seasonal Signs of Climate Change**

Volunteers across the nation are being recruited to get outdoors and help track the effects of climate on seasonal changes in plant and animal behavior.

The USA-National Phenology Network (USA-NPN), a consortium of government, academic and citizen-scientists, is launching a new national program built on volunteer observations of flowering, fruiting and other seasonal events. Scientists and resource managers will use these observations to track effects of climate change on the Earth's life-support systems.

"This program is designed for people interested in participating in climate change science, not just reading about it," said USA-NPN Executive Director and U.S. Geological Survey scientist Jake Weltzin. "We encourage everyone to visit the website (<a href="www.usanpn.org">www.usanpn.org</a>) and then go outside and observe the marvelous cycles of plant and animal life."

From Betty Harkins and Dan Searles' stories of the history of the song boards to Dick Manley's training to be a captain there was a common theme that echoed Pete's stone soup story.

Shabazz Jackson recounted the story of the cleanup of the waterfront and old ferry docks and other early club activities. Tom LaBarr spoke about the clubs history of environmental



action, identifying and pursuing polluters of streams and tributaries.



From the Henry Hudson's journal of his second voyage, June 15<sup>th</sup>, 1608:




while looking overboard saw a mermaid calling the rest of the crew to come see her. One more came up; by that time she was close to the ship's side and looking

# North America's 1st female ship captain

**dies at 93.** Molly K. Carney was the first woman in North America to become a licensed ship captain. Known by her maiden name, Molly Kool she won her captain's papers in 1939. At 23, she made history by earning the title of captain, after the Canadian Shipping Act was rewritten to say "he/she" instead of just "he," She won the respect of her male counterparts as she sailed her father's 70-foot boat in the dangerous waters of the Bay of Fundy.
