Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, July 2, 2010

Call to Order: On a beautiful, warm evening in the sunset alongside the Beacon Sloop Club, Pete Seeger, RJ Storm, Dan Einbender, David Bernz, Michael Scolnich and a host of others led the membership in a rendition of "This Land is Your Land ...". Pete then introduced Club President Rosemary Thomas who welcomed newcomers from New Paltz, Manhattan, Brooklyn and Bloomingburg to Beacon and their first Sloop Club meeting. The first order of business was to sing "Happy Birthday" to Toshi Seeger who graciously thanked everyone for the surprise wishes while Ron Bell presented her a cake that was shared by everyone.

Treasurer's Report, Sarah Elizabeth: Strawberry Festival income from sales was \$10,969.05; from vendors, \$3,995; expenses were \$6,913.32, netting the Club, \$8,050.53. Expenses for the Woody left us with a negative balance for the month, leaving a closing of \$56,729.96.

Woody Report, Jim Birmingham: The Woody sailed this year at the Cornwall RiverFest (6/5), at the Strawberry Festival (6/13) and at Clearwater (6/19-20). All repairs completed during the winter are holding up well. **Alice Vaughan,** master binder by profession, rebound the Woody log. The Woody needs volunteers for upcoming festivals. Building Committee, Claudine Craig: Saul Rozinsky found some unexpected rot in the building trim and needs some help to clear and repair it. The shed needs some work to make it rodent-proof. The sound system will require some upgrades but is performing better than ever now. A big project coming up is interior painting of the Clubhouse along with the addition of some drawers and shelves. Claudine passed a signup sheet.

Strawberry Festival follow-up: Rosemary thanked the over 100 volunteers who helped make this year's Strawberry Festival the best yet. Though we ran out of strawberries, there were bags of shortcake mix that were sold to those present for \$5 each.

Corn Festival [Sunday, August 15] Bonnie Champion, coordinator of the Corn Festival: Many signed up for volunteer positions, but please call Bonnie if you didn't get the sign up sheet. At the last meeting **David Cohen** volunteered to pick up the 1000 ears of corn with some help. He will also chef the nonvegetarian chili. A volunteer will prepare vegetarian chili as well. The road signs are not in the clubhouse. If you know where they are, call Bonnie. Flyers are ready, so please post them liberally.

City of Beacon/MTA Transit Oriented Development (TOD), Tom LaBarr with guest speaker, Jim Korn. of

BeaconDeservesBetter. Jim presented several renderings of the waterfront and potential design prototypes for TOD to show what the future might hold. Though no designs have been put forward, Beacon Deserves Better feels that the City should be very cautious in its consideration of MTA plans and any re-zoning to be considered by the City Council.

There are implications for "viewsheds" from the waterfront to the heights above the station and from the heights to the waterfront. Many issues were raised, including the primal one ... that tracks were laid close along the banks of the Hudson. Its construction followed two hundred years of commercial and financial interests that had matured along the River to exploit its bounty for the exploding population in the region. If it hadn't been for that exploitation, Beacon and the Sloop Club probably wouldn't exist in the first place. Oy. Progress.

Clubhouse and Woody Alarm Systems' False Alarms, Tom LaBarr: When triggered the alarm systems alert the Beacon Police and Tom LaBarr. The police charge the Club a fee for false alarms. Several incidents have been declared false alarms as the result of no evident perpetrator being at the scene. Most of the cases, however, are the result of improper disarming of the alarm systems. If we have the

responsibility of opening or closing the Clubhouse, we have to understand how the alarms work. This will save money and the untoward disturbance of the LaBarr household.

River Pool at Beacon and the Great Newburgh to Beacon Hudson River Swim, Alan Zollner: River Pool is open for the season. Last year the Pool was used by over 1600 visitors, free of charge. It is open Tuesday through Sunday from noon till 6pm. Expenses for insurance, lifeguards, replacement and refurbishment of parts -the next pool – are paid for by the Great Newburgh to Beacon Hudson River Swim. 250 swimmers each raise at least \$140. They are supported by volunteer kayakers. Splash-in for this year's Swim is at 11am, July 31. Check-in begins at 8:30. Volunteers are welcome to help with check-in in Newburgh or landing in Beacon. Alan also showed one of the posters prepared by Cindy Cowden and Betty Harkins based on a photograph of River Front Park, including River Pool, by Linda Hubbard and signed by Pete Seeger. They are being sold to raise money for trees planted in River Front Park.

Spirit Journey Gloria Waslyn & Cameron Williams: On June 5 Tony Angel began a walk of the Appalachian Trail to raise money for the homeless, to bring focus on the environment and in the spirit of Granny Dee. (see http://spiritjourney25.wordpress.com and http://www.familyofwoodstockinc.org). Cameron has been supporting Tony's needs during the journey. On July 2, he had run out of money for food. A hat pass raised \$159.45.

Over the years the Club has developed a program on Wednesday nights to teach rowing in sculls, 8-man shells and other boats.

The meeting was adjourned to the Circle of Song in the Clubhouse at 9:23pm.

A Warning and a Message of Hope

This year's environmental program featured Pace Academy for Applied Environmental Studies senior fellow Andy Revkin and DEC education coordinator Steve Stanne. They joined Pete Seeger on the stage for some



great music and each spoke briefly on environmental issues.

Andy spoke about our dependence on fossil fuels and the fact that we all share some responsibility for the mess in the gulf. Using his attempts to find an affordable green energy solution for his own house as an example he pointed out the need for strategy to break our addiction. Steve brought some good news, announcing that there are big fish swimming in the River. Commercial fishing to satisfy demand for caviar drove down the numbers of large female sturgeon in the 1990s. With the eggs being served up to gourmets, baby sturgeon nearly disappeared from the Hudson. The Hudson stock appears to be recovering since NYSDEC closed the fishery in 1996 and the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission extended that closure to the entire coast in 1998.

The recovery will not be quick. Male Atlantic sturgeon don't reach maturity until they are 12-15 years old; females not until at least age 15 and often not until age 18-20. Thus males born in 1996 were not likely to appear on the spawning grounds till 2008, while females would not be expected to return until at least 2011. Abundance of juveniles increased in the late 1990s, although it is still well below levels seen in the late 1980s. DEC's Hudson River Fisheries Unit has been sampling adults for six or seven years and is seeing a lot of fish, easily over a hundred a year. While we don't have enough data to declare with scientific certainty that the Hudson's Atlantic sturgeon population is increasing, there are encouraging signs.

In 2008, the year that the first males born under protection in 1996 were expected to return, 105 fish were netted. So many were the same size (5.5-6 feet long), as would be expected for a given year class (a group of fish born in the same year), that the researchers took to calling them cookie-cutter fish. Proposed Transit-oriented-development for Beacon



The proposed rezoning of the area surrounding the Beacon train station to create a transit-oriented-development (TOD) district has the potential to fundamentally change the Beacon waterfront and the city itself. The proposed scale of this project suggests that significant changes to the surrounding community are unavoidable. Plans include more than 600 units of housing, more than 100,000 sq. ft. of commercial space and multi-story buildings.

The Beacon Sloop Club has not taken a formal position on the TOD. We do advocate that any plan reflect our core values of free access to the river and environmentally sound practices. While it is extremely gratifying that the waterfront and river that we have worked so hard to restore and protect is now considered an attraction for residents and businesses, careful consideration of the impacts of this plan is required before making any commitment.

We urge our members and all citizens of Beacon to educate yourselves on this critical issue and make your views known to city officials. It is vitally important that all constituencies be heard in order to do what is best for the community, the waterfront, and future generations.

Sound Bites by Gigi Fris



You might know Chris and his wife, Jesse, from their popular Beacon eatery, Homespun, which features delectable goods for vegan, vegetarian and meat eaters alike.

The following is a brief autobiography of Chris Ancliffe, with an additional outline of a sail training program he is planning with the BSC. Chris is an outstanding sailor and Woody captain.

His continuous efforts at maintaining

the harbor as Beacon Harbor Master, as well as representing our interests to the City Council, are greatly appreciated. But let me leave space for the words of the man himself!

My name is Chris Ancliffe and I am the Monday night cocaptain of the Woody Guthrie with Kip Touraine. I started sailing in Seattle around 1980 and raced on mono and multihulls in Puget Sound before moving to the East Coast in 1999. I taught basic keelboat sailing at Manhattan Yacht Club while living in Jersey City. My wife Jessica and I moved to Beacon in 2002. Actually while Jessica was buying our house in Beacon I was in the middle of the Atlantic on a sailboat race from Southampton to Boston.

In 2006 we opened our café Homespun Foods at 232 Main Street because we were tired of commuting away from Beacon everyday to work. This year we expanded the menu and started dinner service on Friday and Saturday nights in the garden patio.

I joined BSC and the Monday crew because I need to be on the water wherever I live and it's a great way to meet people and be part of the community. During all of his sailing experience I kept a record of all of boat time and in 2008 I received a Coast Guard Inland Masters license.

That is a brief history up to now; here is a vision for the future.

I propose starting a hands-on sail-training program at the Club. It could be part of the small boat program. It is based on the American Sailing Association Beginning Keelboat class 101, which is normally taught in one weekend with a lecture on Friday night and two intensive days on the water. I taught this program at Manhattan Yacht Club and it was very successful. Beginning sailors with no experience on Saturday morning could perform a man overboard rescue under sail at the end of the class on Sunday afternoon. The ASA class has an exam and successful students (everyone passes) receive a certificate of basic competency.

What do we need to get this going at BSC? I propose soliciting donations of two J-24 (or similar) boats to be used in the program. The J-24 was used at MYC and it is a good size for 4 students and 1 teacher. They are cheap used boats, usually in the \$4000 range with sails, a trailer and sometimes an outboard. Used sails and rigs are readily available. Two identical boats are a good idea because once the students get a little experience there is nothing like a couple of short races (two sailboats going in the same direction is the definition of a race) to get them excited and teach valuable skills. At MYC we laid out some simple race courses with buoys and each student had to sail the boat around them.

Each boat should have a small outboard because we all know it's possible to go sailing on the Hudson, have the wind die, and be taken by the current to Chelsea or Cold Spring.

Basically the class structure is a 3 hour lecture and about 12 hours of boat time. It covers identification of boat types, boat parts and sails, points of sail, tacking, jibing, rules of the road, simple knots, lights and aids to navigation identification, federal regulations on alcohol, plastic and oil spills, safety, very basic first aid, clothing, radio, and emergencies. Every student should be able to perform a man overboard recovery under sail at the end of the class. This class could also be taught weekend nights during the summer.

A program with the local High Schools or some other local youth organization would be a great introduction to the Hudson River and the Club and bring in new, younger members.

So what are the issues with this proposal?

- (1) It would need the approval of the Club membership.
- (2) Tax exemptions would need to be offered to get people to donate boats.
- (3) The program has to be at least revenue neutral. Some costs will be incurred that have to be offset. Maintenance, storage, boat and trailer registration, fuel and wear and tear have to be paid for. I estimate about \$5000 annually to maintain two boats including the required insurance. The Club would need to charge enough for the classes to cover these expenses the same way it already does for the current sailing class.
