It also looks like the Dakota Indian Riders who are riding on horseback from the Dakotas to New York City will be coming here for our corn Festival. It should be lots of fun.

We are also planning some activities for Earth Day. The first will be a screening of "Chasing Ice" on April 13th. We hope you will join us.

Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, March 1, 2013

Meeting began at 7:34 p.m. with Michael Scolnick leading the club in singing "Putting on the Agony" David Eberle welcomed new guests from South Salem, NY and from Chile. Sarah Elisabeth gave the treasurer's report. The club has a closing balance of \$81,337. (Full report may be found elsewhere in the newsletter)

Tom LaBarr gave the Woody and Woody Dinner reports. Work will start on Sunday at White's Marina and at Tom's House clearing out the coop to make room for some old parts from the Sojourner Truth. There will be a Woody Sailor's meeting at 11:00 a.m. at White's Marina on March 10th to discuss this year's festival schedule and other matters. Sailor maintenance hours and membership status will be checked more rigorously this year.

The Woody Dinner will be March 9th at 6:00 p.m. at River Terrace in Beacon. Mark McNutt will be performing music. Let Tom know as soon as possible if you still want to attend.

David Eberle and Saul Rozinsky gave the Building Report. David reported that the Sloop Club Board approved a contract for Aaron Havens to rebuild the wall behind the stove. Saul Rozinsky showed how extensive the termite damage was to that wall and then reiterated the reasons for the construction and that the new wall will be built to be a weight-bearing wall. Hope Altin inquired about whether or not any work will be done on the multrum. David and Saul said some work was done after the hurricane. Saul explained that the ventilation for the multrum will be considered. David then passed a sign up sheet for multrum cleanup.

Alan Thomas reported on the winter lecture series that the March lecture will be the Kingston Chantey Singers on March 15th at 7:00 p.m. He handed out posters and asked that they be spread around the area. The April program will be for young people and in May there will be a film showing about wooden boat building.

Saul Rozinsky announced that he will be doing a workshop on solar energy in the parking lot outside the Sloop Club on April 20th at 12:00 p.m.

J.C. Calderon and Alan Thomas announced that on April 13th at the Beacon Theater the Academy Award nominated film "Chasing Ice" will be shown. The film's director will be in attendance and will do a discussion. The event is co-sponsored by the Beacon Public Space Project. All proceeds will go to the Sloop Woody Guthrie.

Bonnie Champion and Roland Moussaa reported that this year's Corn Festival (August 11th) will be a mix of themes between Corn, Solar Energy, and a Native American theme. David Eberle added to their report that on August 3rd the Two Row Wampum celebration will be in Beacon and there will be a small festival for them.

Dan Einbender asked if the club was planning on doing anything for the Beacon Centennial celebration in 2013.

Announcements: James Malchow announced that Clearwater is having a membership drive in March and is hoping to sign up 300 new members. Former and current members are encouraged to rejoin or renew. James also noted that for any Sloop Club members who expect to volunteer for the Clearwater Revival (including sailing the Woody), the early bird volunteer sign up period lasts until March 14th. The volunteer fee (which covers festival admission, food, parking, a t-shirt, and a year's membership to Clearwater) is \$46 during that time as opposed to \$56. James Malchow also announced that on April 27th the New Jersey Folk Festival will be held in New Brunswick, NJ. Anyone interested in attending or volunteering can contact him.

Don Raskopf announced that fracking has essentially been halted due to the State Health Commissioner's refusal to approve it.

Connie Hogarth reminded the club of the pending Supreme Court decision regarding the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and announced that March is Women's History Month. She also announced that on March 3rd, the Southern Dutchess NAACP is celebrating Women's History Month at the Howland Center on Women and the Environment at 2:00.

Nora Gallardo announced that a Women's Rights conference will be held on March 7th at 6:30 p.m. at SUNY New Paltz.

Eugene Hamond announced that a fundraising dinner dance for aid to Central America and other regions will be held on March 30th at 3 p.m. For more information contact Eugene.

Dan Einbender announced that from March 8th through March 10th students from different countries will be staying in Beacon. They will be doing work for the Sloop Club on Saturday and work on the Woody on Sunday. The work on Sunday will be followed by a potluck at the Clubhouse.

Jacob Bernz announced that on March 29th at the Howland Center at 7:30 there will be a Something to Say Cafe featuring Thomas Wesley Stern.



Fracking In New York State “on Hold”!

New York was unable to issue regulations for high-volume hydrofracking at the end of February. By missing a Feb. 13 procedural deadline the DEC will have to restart the process. There will have to be another round of public hearings, and another opportunity to submit comments to the DEC.

The DEC failed to meet its deadline because the state's Department of Health was unable to complete a review of the health impacts of fracking and asked to wait for the completion of studies underway elsewhere before issuing a position.

Governor Cuomo has said that he is committed to "letting science decide" the fate of fracking in New York. That is great if true and the science can deliver clear cut answers. It's more likely that there will still be unknowns and that politics will continue to drive actions in Albany.

The fact that the DOH entered into the process late in the game is the direct result of the pressure put on the governor by the public and evidence that we do have a voice if we choose to use it. We need everyone to continue to speak out as the process continues and see that all the issues are addressed.

There are still many other unanswered questions. What is the impact on climate change? What is the true impact on local communities in the long run? Is the perceived local jobs boom real?

Let's give Governor Cuomo the thanks he deserves for putting science at the forefront of the debate, but make sure we hold him to it. Keep asking the tough questions, demand peer review, and demand open discussion.

Schumer Calls for Flood Protection

Saying that Hudson River water levels are predicted to rise by nine inches in seven years, U.S. Sen. Chuck Schumer called for federal protection of Hudson River communities from flooding. Schumer called for Hudson River waterfront communities to be included in a \$20 million flood prevention study by the Army Corps of Engineers.

Some studies predict that by 2080, high tides on the Beacon/Newburgh waterfront could hit Irene-levels at high tide every day,

Dear Sloop Club Friends,

Jaime Plym and Maurice Enis are former US navy navigators who served on the aircraft carrier USS Ronald Reagan. The USS Reagan was at the forefront of the US governments aide to the people of Japan after the earthquake, tsunami, and meltdown of the nuclear reactors at Fukushima. They were exposed to unknown amounts of radiation. The Reagan went into dry dock for radiological decontamination. The people were not so lucky. Clearwater and the Indian Point Safe Energy Coalition are bringing them to New York for the second commemoration of the ongoing disaster on the northeast coast of Japan.

Jaime and Maurice met on shipboard and fell in love. They are now living in Florida, going to school and working. Jaime is studying to be a marine biologist. Maurice is studying and trying to find work. They are both now experiencing multiple health problems consistent with exposure to unplanned releases of radiation: bleeding, tumors, hair loss. As you can imagine they are concerned about their future. Maurice just got a letter from the US Navy telling him that he will have to pay for his own medical care now because his paper work was "lost."

What is happening to Maurice and Jaime now could happen to all of us living in the contamination zone of Indian Point should there be an unplanned release of radiation. You can meet Jaime and Maurice on Sunday, March 10, 2 pm, at Stony Point Conference Center, 17 Crickettown Road, Stony Point, NY. Kevin Kamps, Beyond Nuclear radiation waste specialist, will be there to answer your questions on radiation. Andy Spano, former Westchester County Executive Executive, will talk about the evacuation plan myth. There will be a potluck dinner at 5 pm and a screening of Cold Shut Down, a film shot last year in Fukushima by Professor Martin Lucas, Hunter College, who will lead a discussion after the film. Cold Shut Down shows what it is like in Japan to live with radiation in you daily environment and how people are coping with it. Join us if you can. You are also invited to join the Peace Walkers at Noon on Saturday as they walk to Indian Point There will be a vigil at the plant at 3:30 when they arrive. You are welcome to join them there if you do not want to walk. More info follows below.

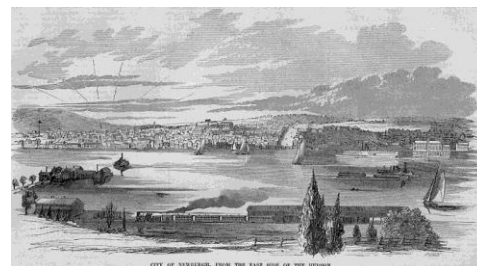
The Transformation of the Beacon Waterfront

Railroad historian Bernard Rudberg spoke to a full house on the Central New England Railroad and evolution of the Beacon waterfront as part of the winter lecture series.



Over the years the area has gone from its natural state, to a industrialized freight terminal (1910's), to a passenger hub (1940's), to abandoned (1960's where we came in), to the mixed use area that it is today. Along the way the physical landscape was altered many times by dredging, fill, and the building of piers and jetties.

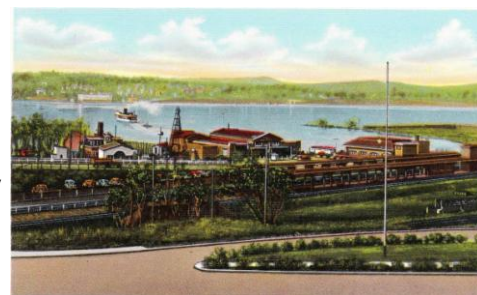
1857 shortly after the arrival of the railroad



Circa 1913 this entire yard area was built on fill.

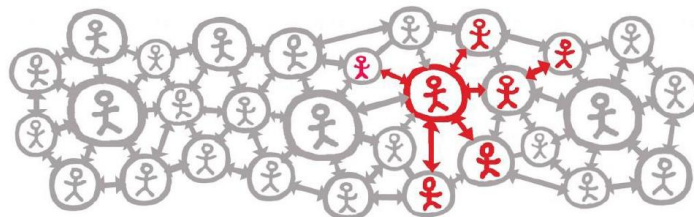



1949 with Ferry Terminal, Train Station, and Ferry Diner

"The Kingston Sea Chantey Singers" is a project of Heritage Folk Music, Inc. It is a group organized to celebrate the historic age of sail and industry along the river. While many chanteys are sung a cappella, the KSSS has several talented musicians able to add accompaniment on guitar, banjo, concertina, harmonica and autoharp. The original KSSS was organized in the 1980's and performed frequently at the Hudson River Maritime Museum. Chanteys are working songs from the age of iron men and wooden ships. The songs were tailored to specific tasks, weighing anchor, hoisting sails, or tacking. Typically led by the chanteyman and answered with a chorus by the crew they helped lighten the load and coordinate actions.
