Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting

Minutes, July 4, recorded by Trish Murphy

Opening Music: Ken Miller opened the meeting with a wonderfully performed folk song. He explained to attendees, with a detailed description, the meaning of a "sawyer". He then sang an enchanting song, accompanied by Corinne Leloup on violin, about the "Hudson River Sawyer".

Opening Announcements: After the crowd was canvassed for newcomers, new attendees Amy from New Paltz and Lisa were welcomed warmly.

Fareground: Amy introduced herself as the executive director of "Fair Ground" and thanked the Beacon Sloop Club for their support. She spoke of some valuable outreach work that her organization does for the community, such as providing groceries for up to approximately 200 households every week and hosting free lunches and dinners to the community at various locations. The program currently serves the residents of Beacon, Wappingers, Newburgh, and a small portion of Poughkeepsie. The meals at the Beacon location are provided at the Presbyterian church located at 50 Liberty Street from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

Treasury Report: Aaron gave a detailed treasury report for the month of May. (See treasurer's report for full details). Aaron lamented that, after nine years, his term as treasurer would have to come to an end due to newly imposed workplace regulations. Aaron asked for anyone interested to reach out to him. Training and support will be provided to anyone willing to run.

Strawberry Festival: This year's Strawberry Festival was once again a success due to the dedicated volunteers that made it possible. It is hoped that volunteerism will be increased for next year. Gratitude for the volunteers was expressed.

Corn Festival: The Corn Festival is set to take place on Sunday August 10th from 12:00 to 5:00 p.m. Volunteers are greatly needed, especially for set up and break down. Anyone interested in joining the team to make this year's Corn Festival a successful event for the community is welcome to come the day of the event or to reach out to a Sloop Club representative in advance.

Woody Maintenance: The Woody is currently actively sailing. Captain Steve explained the development of the Woody maintenance plan and gave a description of what the current seventh year will optimally look like. This possibly includes winter touch up repair work being completed on the hull, work on the center board, the motor hatch carlins, the repair of outside boards, the replacement of the decades old cutlass bearing, and the adding of drainage holes. The Woody currently needs some minor work but is in an overall good condition and is taking out guests.

Harbor Report: Captain Steve opened by speaking of the development of the pilings securing Long Dock. The astonishing forty-seven-foot-long steel pilings are now safely secured forty feet down into the earth. Captain Steve explained that the Beacon Sloop Club currently has a one-year agreement with Bannerman's Island in relation to usage of our dock by their vessel called the "Estuary Steward". He explained that the extra length added to the dock to accommodate the Estuary Steward benefits everyone by adding extra strength to the dock.

It was learned that Metro-North recently expressed that they will likely not restore ferry service to Beacon and Newburgh. The ferry greatly helped prevent silt buildup in the harbor. If ferry service does not restore, other options such as extending the dock to allow in larger ships, will be explored to control the silt problem.

Environmental Report: Captain Tom opened his report with the positive news that a solar powered boat is now taking out guests in Kingston. He shared the interesting fact that some of the indigenous people of the Amazon are now choosing solar boats over diesel powered. At least eight tribes have switched to solar powered over fossil fuels. Captain Tom then shared the devastating news that our governor would like to open a new nuclear power plant approximately half the size of the infamous Indian Point plant. He strongly encouraged listeners to write to the governor and object to this terrible possibility. Captain Tom expressed his sincere concern for future generations to come.

Building Committee: Progress has been made to the section of roofing over the children's area. The Multrum lock must also be looked at. The latter is directly due to the startling revelation that a vandal has destroyed four locks in the past three weeks in order to illegally access the Multrum. The culprit is currently unknown and is at large. Plans to weed the area along the left outer clubhouse wall were revealed.

Hudson River Swim: Bonnie Champion informed listeners that the River Swim will take place on Saturday July 26th from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Volunteers determine the number of participants being as safety protocol requires one volunteer kayaker for every two to three swimmers. Bonnie showed her full support for the event by revealing this will mark her fifteenth year of participation. She explained that the River Swim is not a race, and participants are welcome to swim at a safe and leisurely pace for the entire duration of the swim. Bonnie offered to pass around a signup sheet for those wishing to volunteer to ensure another successful Hudson River Swim. Volunteer jet skiers, kayakers, and other positions are greatly needed.

Closing Announcements: President Patricia Finnerty reminded all that the Beacon Sloop Club is a carry in and carry out facility. **Danielle** introduced herself and generously offered free tomato and ornamental plants to anyone present who would like one or more. **John McLaughlin** invited volunteers to join him at the Chelsea yacht Club at 9:30 a.m. to collect fish and crabs for the Corn Festival E-Tent in August. **Wayne** shared his experience of meeting with people in Fukushima (where the 2011 Fukushima nuclear accident occurred) and urged listeners to reject the idea of nuclear power. A member spoke of the Cragsmoor Bear Festival on August 10th. All proceeds from this fun and unique event benefit Bear Hill. Flyers were made available to members. President Patricia Finnerty volunteered to clean the Multrum. A new volunteer is needed for next month.

Adjournment: A motion to adjourn was made and seconded at 8:23 p.m.

Improvements to Our Long Dock

Thank you to Captain Steve and our volunteers who hauled out the old dock-builders t-shirts and joined the folks from the Bannerman's Island Trust to install piling brackets and the new dock sections.

We were able to make much-needed improvements to the security and stability of the dock, enabling a home for the Estuary Steward, while a solution to the ferry dock issue is pursued. Much of the expense was funded through Bannerman's, saving us much time and energy seeking and administering grants.

2025 River Swim


